<Purpose>

This workshop is conducted as part of Ministry of Health, Labour and Welfare's Research Grant funded research which aims to develop an effective global health diplomacy educational program. There is an urgent need to cultivate human resources who can advocate for global health at the global level in harmony with international and national interests at governance meetings such as the World Health Assembly. This workshop was designed and will be implemented to help achieve such goals.

<Target audience>

The workshop is open to young and mid-level public and private sector practitioners who are planning to participate in a governing body meeting of international organizations and have little experience in such international meetings. Possible affiliations include MHLW, MOFA, JICA, NCGM, universities, think tanks, NGOs, etc. Expect number of participants: 16 participants and observers (both on a recommendation basis)

CV/Profile

In the past eight years, Dr. Hiroki Nakatani has held academic positions in Japan as Visiting Professor of Keio University and Invited Professor at Osaka University Post Graduate School of Medicine. He is the former Chair of the Executive Board of WHO (2019-2020) and Chair of the Committee A of the 75th World Health Assembly in 2022.. Currently, Dr. Nakatani also serves in various national and international organizations as Adviser (International Affairs) to the Minister of Health, Labour and Welfare; Chair, Board of Directors, Global Health Innovative Technology Fund (GHIT Fund); and Director, Human Resource Strategy Center for Global Health. He is a veteran public health specialist for over 45 years, who started his career at the Ministry of Health, Labour and Welfare in Japan. He worked extensively in health policy, public health, international health, and health science and technology. His national career includes serving as Director-General of Health and Welfare Services in Hiroshima Prefecture, where he was in charge of integrating health and welfare services in preparation for the arrival of a rapidly ageing society. Regarding international career, he served the WHO Headquarters twice. From March 2007 to May 2015, he served as Assistant Director-General of WHO, leading the largest technical cluster of HIV/AIDS, Tuberculosis, Malaria and Neglected Tropical Diseases. Dr. Nakatani received his MD from Keio University School of Medicine, MHPEd from the University of New South Wales, and a Ph.D. from Keio University.

Lecture summary

The first session, "WHO and its role in global health governance," aims to achieve the following objectives: (1) to understand evolution, definition and frameworks of global health, (2) to understand the complex architecture of global health with special attention to UN agencies' roles, particularly WHO; (3) to understand the governance and operation style of WHO; (4) to gain practical skills to be an influential contributor in governing body meetings. This starts by digesting the massive volume of background paper in a relatively short time. Participants are invited to visit the WHO governing bodies website (Ref.2) before coming to class. This experience will make participants miserable initially, but after the session, everyone will feel encouraged. The following Mock-up sessions aim at being an effective contributor in the official meetings. The four-step approach will be practiced; (1) Reviewing the background paper; (2) Digesting the instruction given by the Government after inter-ministerial discussion; (3) Drafting intervention and making actual intervention to fellow participants. At each step, there are seasoned hints and skills. Mock exercises enable participants to improve each one's intervention by practice and constructive comments by facilitators and among fellow participants.

Saki NAKAMURA, MD, is a board-certified pediatrician working as a medical technical officer in the Government of Japan. She spent more than three years in the International Affairs Division in the Ministry of Health, Labour and Welfare, where she has negotiated the amendments to the International Health Regulations (IHR) 2005 and the pandemic instrument towards their adoption at the 77th World Health Assembly. She has also worked with Colombia, the Democratic Republic of Congo, WHO, UNICEF and CEPI in the recent mpox response. Currently, she is working on national policy development in the field of maternal and child health, which involves policy research planning, child health checkups, child death reviews and human milk banks. She received her BSc from McGill University and MD from Hamamatsu University School of Medicine.

My lecture aims to prepare participants for the WHO's governing body meetings where they are expected to form a national position and make effective summary interventions.

Haruka SAKAMOTO, MD MPH, PhD, is a primary care physician and visiting associate professor at the St Luke's International University. She got her M.D from Sapporo Medical University and worked as a physician at St Luke's International Hospital in Tokyo for several years. She then got a scholarship from the World Bank and got her MPH at the Harvard T.H Chan School of Public Health. From 2011-2013 and 2016, she worked at the international cooperation department, Ministry of Health, Labour and Welfare of Japan, where she was deeply involved in health policy activities in Japan. As part of the work, she participated in WHO meetings, G7 meetings, and bilateral cooperation activities through JICA (Japan International Cooperation Agency). She got PhD from University of Tokyo in 2021, and she's also currently working at World Health Organization Western Pacific Regional Office as a consultant, senior manager at Health and Global Policy Institute, senior fellow at Tokyo Foundation for Policy Research, and Associate Member of the Science Council of Japan (26th). Her current research focuses on health system strengthening, health care financing, and politics in global health.

Lecture summary

Many people are unfamiliar with an intervention at international conferences and have no idea what is the "format" of an intervention. In this lecture, I will show you what to include in your intervention, starting with the format of interventions you should make at international conferences (mainly at the WHO meetings). On the other hand, I will tell you about some bad things you better not to say (don't).



Kensuke NAKAJIMA

For the past seven years, Dr. Kensuke NAKAJIMA has been a professor at Nagasaki University, where he is responsible for bio-risk management at Japan's first suit-type BSL-4 facility. While working at the Ministry of Health, Labor and Welfare and the National Institute of Infectious Diseases, he was involved in formulating pathogen control regulations based on the Infectious Diseases Act, worked hard to operate BSL-4 facilities, and even inspected and surveyed 15 BSL-4 facilities in 13 countries around the world. From 2015 to 2017, he was responsible for the infectious diseases research division of the newly established AMED, where he was involved in planning research grants related to emerging and re-emerging infectious diseases. From 2009 to 2015, he was in charge of three areas of infectious disease epidemiology surveys, zoonotic disease control, and pathogen control regulations at the Tuberculosis and Infectious Diseases Division of MHLW, where he contributed to various infectious disease control measures, including the 2009 influenza pandemic response, consideration of MERS countermeasures, response to SFTS newly confirmed in Japan, response to the confirmed outbreak of rabies in wild animals in Taiwan, response to the dengue fever outbreak in Tokyo, and response to the Ebola hemorrhagic fever that began in West Africa. Prior to that, he was assigned to Dr. Hiroki Nakatani's division on MHLW as the first veterinarian, and was involved in domestic response in light of the anthrax terrorist incident in the US, response to imported animals suspected of being infected with tularemia and also monkeypox, formulating the first contingency plan for rabies in Japan, response to the SARS epidemic and the first revision of the Infectious Diseases Act in light of the outbreak. He is a veterinarian who completed his master's degree in veterinary medicine at the Nippon Veterinary and Livestock University. After graduation, he was employed as a veterinary officer at the Ministry of Health and Welfare. He subsequently held positions in the ministry's food hygiene department and the food safety unit at WHO headquarters, before working in the field of infectious disease control.

Lecture summary

First, I would like to explain what the Manhattan Principles "One World, One Health" are, why they were proposed, and in what forum they were proposed, along with the key points they set out. Next, I will introduce the efforts that countries around the world have made in relation to One Health, the flow of responses from international organizations, and explain the issues currently being considered. After that, I will touch on zoonosis, the source of the idea of One Health, and confirm with the audience what the idea behind infectious disease control is in the first place. I will then explain my experience at the Ministry of Health, Labor and Welfare, particularly in responding to infectious diseases caused by pathogens of animal origin, using actual examples, and explain the specific background to the need for One Health and solutions to issues using One Health.

Dr. Satoshi "TOSHI" Ezoe currently serves as the Deputy Assistant Minister for Global Health at the Ministry of Health, Labour and Welfare of Japan (MHLW) as well as the Director for Planning and Coordination at the National Institute of Public Health since August 2024. Dr Ezoe is a health diplomat and a medical officer promoting public health nationally and globally. He joined MHLW in 2002 after clinical training. He has since then engaged in health care and public health policy, including in the areas of global health, universal health insurance system, non-communicable diseases, including mental health and cancer control, and infectious diseases crisis management. He was seconded to UNAIDS Headquarters in Geneva (2009-2012). He was the first appointed Senior Coordinator for Global Health at MHLW (2015-2017). He was a Counsellor of the Permanent Mission of Japan to the United Nations (2017-2020), where he was instrumental in facilitating UN General Assembly High-Level Meetings on tuberculosis (2018) and universal health coverage (2019). In August 2020, amid the COVID-19 crisis, he became the Director of the Global Health Policy Division at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, where he was responsible for coordinating overall global health strategy and diplomacy, including COVID-19 response, health agendas for the G7 Hiroshima Summit in 2023, and contribution to global health institutions and Initiatives such as the WHO, UNFPA, the Global Fund, Gavi, UNITAID and UHC2030. He was the corresponding author for two prime ministers and a foreign minister who contributed vision articles in the Lancet on global health. He is a Medical Doctor with a PhD and received a dual Master of Public Health and Public Administration from Harvard University.

Lecture summary

This lecture intends to share examples of key and difficult negotiations on global health based on hand-on experience by the presenter. These cases would include but not limited to below:

In particular, as the Secretary of the FAO/WHO Codex Alimentarius Commission (2003-2009), he organized over 20 international meetings every year and facilitated inter-country negotiations for international standard setting. He is fluent in French and English and is regularly maintaining his knowledge in Spanish, Italian and German.

Lecture summary

The Preamble of the Japanese Constitution (1946) states: "... We (the Japanese people) desire to occupy an honored place in an international society designed and dedicated to the preservation of peace, and the banishment of tyranny and slavery, oppression and intolerance, for all time from the earth. ..." Well, then, what can you do in practice to occupy such a place in the international community? By what means and how? It is indeed important to voice what your concerns and what you want, and even more so to share a vision and build an alliance. But what if your vision is not shared with other actors, or not even within your own country? Are you ready to pursue fighting in isolation? Or, are you giving up? Is there a way in between? Good preparation at home, in advance of a negotiation, is a key to a successful outcome.
